The New Diaspora: The Dispersal of Bibliographic Control in a Collaborative Universe, An Overview of "On the Record: Report of the Library of Congress Working Group on the Future of Bibliographic Control"

The formal charge to the Working Group on the Future of Bibliographic Control was to present findings on how bibliographic control and other descriptive practices can effectively support management of and access to library materials in the evolving information and technology environment; recommend ways in which the library community can collectively move toward achieving this vision; and advise the Library of Congress on its role and priorities. Dr. José-Marie Griffiths, co-chair of the Working Group, will provide an overview of the future the Group envisioned for bibliographic control, how the working group came to its conclusions, the recommendations of the report and an update on comments or actions subsequent to the publication of the report.
