

Regulations Problems in U.S?

- ▶ 1930's New Deal Legislation
- Citizens needed to access to regulations
- Regulations and their effects needed to be known in advance by citizens
- ▶ U.S. courts began to see "secret law" as a violation and against the U.S. Constitution





U.S. Regulation History

Federal Register Act (1935)

- Legal structure for regulatory system
- Single publication Federal Register – allowed for central filing/public inspection
- Includes Proposed/Final Rules, Notices, Presidential Documents
- Code of Federal Regulationscodification of the Federal Register – added in 1937

Administrative Procedure Act (1946)

- Added due process public participation
- Agencies must give notice of proposed rules in the FR
- Agencies must receive and take action on public comments
- Rules need to state the legal basis and purpose
- Rules effective only after 30 days sometimes longer



Organization in the FR & CFR

Federal Register (FR)

- Initial publishing of the information in chronological order
- Each issue is first organized alphabetically by agency
- Within each agency, the organization is: Rules (Final), Proposed Rules, and then Notices
- CFR Parts Affected
 - ▶ End of Table of Contents list of CFR parts affected for FR issue
 - ▶ Readers Aid (at end of issue) list of CFR parts affected for current month

Code of Federal Regulations (CFR)

- Republishing of regulations in codified form by subject
- ▶ 50 Titles representing the subjects (over 200 volumes)
- Each title is completely revised and reissued yearly $\frac{1}{4}$ of the volumes are reprinted quarterly
 - ▶ Title I Title I6 as of January I
 - \blacktriangleright Title I7 27 as of April I
 - ▶ Title 28 Title 41 as of July 1
 - ▶ Title 42 Title 50 as of October I



Federal Register Content Proposed Rules

- Preliminary Rulemaking advanced notices, petitions, and negotiated rulemaking
- Proposed Rules also known at NPRM (Notice of Proposed Rulemaking)
 - Announces changes to CFR
 - Gives proposed regulatory text, often gives detailed description of proposal
 - Solicits public comments on proposed rule must consider comments and justify decisions to finalize, change, or withdraw proposed rules
- Misc. Proposals and Updates extend time for comments, withdraw/change proposed rules, waivers, exemptions, and interpretations of enforcement policy

Federal Register Content Final Rules

- Final Rules final legal effect, general applicability to public
 - Amends the CFR, finalizes a proposed rule (or takes action without a prior proposed rule for GOOD CAUSE)
 - Effective at least 30 days from date of publication in most cases (60 days for major rules and on date of publication for emergencies)
 - Also Interim Final Rules, Direct Final Rules, other documents relating to previous rules
 - Generally includes less supplementary information as compared to the Proposed Rule

Nonroad Technical Amendments

AGENCY: Environmental Protection

Agency (EPA).

ACTION: Final rule.

SUMMARY: EPA is adopting amendments to the technical hardship provisions under the Transition Program for Equipment Manufacturers related to the Tier 4 standards for nonroad diesel engines, and to the replacement engine exemption generally applicable to new nonroad engines. These provisions may have minor impacts on the costs and emission reductions of the underlying regulatory programs amended in this action, though in most cases these are simple technical amendments. For those provisions that may have a minor impact on the costs or benefits of the amended regulatory program, any potential impacts would be small and we have not attempted to quantify the potential changes.

DATES: This final rule is effective on March 10, 2014, except for § 1039.625(m) which will be effective on February 6, 2014.

AGENCY: Food and Drug Administration,

ACTION: Direct final rule.

SUMMARY: The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is amending its regulation regarding the confidentiality of data and information in and about new animal drug application files to change when certain approval-related information will be disclosed by the Agency. This change will ensure that the Agency is able to update its list of approved new animal drug products within the statutory timeframe. It will also permit more timely public disclosure of approval-related information, increasing the transparency of FDA decision making in the approval of new animal drugs.

I. Background

Section 512(i) (21 U.S.C. 360b(i)) was added to the Federal Food, Drug, and Agency shall publish a list of approved new animal drug products and revise that list every 30 days to include each new animal drug that has been approved during that 30-day period. This list, as well as related patent information and marketing exclusivity periods, is contained in a document generally known as the "Green Book," available at the Agency's public Web site at http://www.fda.gov/AnimalVeterinary/Products/ApprovedAnimalDrugProducts.

The editorial and clearance processes for publishing the Federal Register notice announcing the approval of an NADA varies from 1 to 2 months after the approval letter is issued to the applicant. Consequently, the addition of newly approved product information to the "Green Book" and public disclosure of certain other approval-related information at the Agency's public Web site is delayed until after that Federal Register notice is published. Such other approval-related information may include the summary of information forming the basis for approval (known also as the Freedom of Information Summary) and documentation of environmental review. Trade and proprietary information in the application file remains confidential and is not disclosed.

Example of Direct Final Rule – no proposed rule – FDA is trying to increase its own transparency

List of CFR Sections Affected (LSA)

- Additional monthly publication to track changes to the CFR
- Official publication to ensure that the most current changes are available for CFR sections
- Print CFR is published yearly print volumes are often NOT be up to date
- eCFR (http://www.ecfr.gov) provides for electronic updating of the Code of Federal Regulations
 - ▶ Currency note e-CFR Data is current as of April 10, 2014
 - User note not considered an official, legal edition but much easier to use!



Unified Regulatory Agenda

- Since 1983 the Agenda issued twice per year (Spring and Fall) as issues of the Federal Register
- Provides agency rules either under development or review generally those with regulatory action within 12 months
- Access to the Agenda is primarily electronic through http://reginfo.gov (as a way to reduce printing costs)
- Regulatory Flexibility Act (1980) regulates the Agenda to contain only entries that are likely to have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities
- Content includes: abstract of rule, timetable for rule development, contact information, and potential effects of rule
- Also Includes the Regulatory Plan
 - Acts as defining statement of the Administration's regulatory/deregulatory policies and priorities
 - In the fall issue of the Unified Agenda



Code of Federal Regulations Content

- Final rules or regulations are then codified in the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) by broad subject categories subject to Federal regulation
- The CFR contains Federal rules that have general applicability and are for current and future effect – regulations that do not meet this stipulation will not be codified in the CFR
- Kept up to date by individual issues of the Federal Register – both need to be used to determine the latest version of a given rule



(a) De novo institutions and operating noninsured institutions. The applicant shall publish a notice as prescribed in §303.7 in a newspaper of general circulation in the community in which the main office of the depository institution is or will be located. Federal Register

- 68 FR 1234 typical reference for FR
 - 68 is the volume number (annual)
 - 1234 is the page number
- Page numbers run consecutively throughout entire annual volume
- Knowing how to form proper citations makes it much easier to get to the exact information when searching.

CFR

- 40 CFR 50.4 typical reference for CFR
 - 40 refers to the title
 - 50 refers to a part within Title 40
 - .4 refers to a section within 40 CFR 50
- Each title also has Chapters which generally are named with the agency responsible for the regulations. These chapters are not part of the citations.
- The date of the CFR used should also be notated.
